

Denis Huffman Van Buren ISD Dr. William C. Morse Teacher of the Year

Denis Huffman, a computer networking instructor at Van Buren Intermediate School District's Technology Center, effectively differentiates instruction for all of his students regardless of their needs. What is remarkable though is that he has no formal training in special education. Denis doesn't view those students who bring special challenges to his highly technical class as disabled or limited English proficient, they are all simply his students.

A prime example of this is Jacob, a past recipient of a "Yes I Can!" award who is blind. Jacob's addition to Denis's class began a remarkable exploration of ways to accommodate a totally blind student in mastering a curriculum that is primarily visually based. Denis was extremely successful. Denis was extremely successful, and as a result of these efforts Jacob ranked in the top 10 in a national networking competition and is

now pursuing networking in college. This is only one example, as many other students across Van Buren County have similar success stories. Denis is a shining example of the kind of general educator that we all hope our students with disabilities encounter, but rarely do.

Lauren Hogikyan is a student at Grand Valley State University with a double major in Special Education and Comprehensive Science and Arts for Teaching. During her time at Grand Valley, she has served the collegiate chapter of the Council for Exceptional Children. Lauren acted as the pen-pal chair, Vice-President, and is currently the President of the Michigan CEC Student Chapter. Lauren has encouraged many students to join the Council for Exceptional Children at the local, state and national level. Furthermore, Lauren led many students to take on positions on the collegiate and state student board based on her inspiring leadership skills.

Timothy Bury is a 22 year old student with a cognitive impairment. Tim attends the Post High School Transition Program through Wayne-Westland Community Schools. When Tim first began the transition program he struggled with anxiety, lack of confidence and a sense of needing reassurance with one on one coaching. Tim is a kind young man who works very hard to achieve his goals. The hard work Tim puts in was shown through his commitment to being prepared for work every day, and coming in with a positive energetic attitude. Tim's hard work and dedication have paid off as he's made great accomplishments within the area of transition. Tim is currently working at Westfit Gym through the transition program. He has worked for them the past three years in assisting with gym maintenance and works independently. His boss can't wait for Tim to finish the transition program so he can hire him as a full time employee. Tim is also currently pursuing his dream of one

day becoming a personal trainer and has begun taking CPT (certified personal trainer) certificate classes, in order to obtain his goal. His supervisor at Westfit gym has also given Tim responsibilities of assisting with special case training at the gym. Tim's self confidence has grown tremendously and he takes initiative in what he is doing and knows what needs to be done. There is no doubt that Tim possesses the skills to have a very bright future, and with continued dedication he will have no problem reaching his goals.

DeAnte Vaughn is a senior at Pioneer High School in the Ann Arbor Public Schools. He is a talented musician, who started playing the drums at the age of 8 years old and continues to play the drums, keyboard, organ and synthesizer. DeAnte loves playing music because it makes him feel great. He plays at his church and is a member of the "Know Obstacles Band". The band was featured in a recent interview on WXYZ Detroit Channel 7. "Know Obstacles Band" performs at several different venues in and around the Ann Arbor area. DeAnte is very enthusiastic about playing music (sometimes he needs to be reminded not to engage in music during instructional time). DeAnte will let you know that "music" makes him feel happy, and it helps him be prepared.

Luke's strengths have shown to be perfect attendance, following directions, and processing constructive criticism. As a result of Luke's hard work, he now works independently at his job site within the district's career-tech center and board office, where he does custodial/building and grounds work. He has shown such a growth

in maturity since beginning the program and is able to adapt to change within his routine at work and within the classroom. He has also established wonderful relationships with his peers and coworkers and is very well known within the buildings where he works. Luke is well on his way to achieving his goals within the area of transition and has worked very hard to get to this point.

Joshua Price is a 4th grader in Wayne-Westland Community Schools. Joshua has a medical diagnosis of CHARGE syndrome and a bilateral severe to profound hearing loss, Choanal Atresia. 

Essential for Living: Making Skills Functional Again

In recent years, many teachers, curriculum coordinators, and behavior analysts alike have struggled with what to teach children with moderate-to-severe disabilities or limited skill repertoires, especially as they grow older. Schools are often instructed to adhere to the Common Core State Standards, while ABA programs often offer only developmental curricula designed to help young children catch up to their typicallydeveloping peers. When educational and behavioral professionals look for alternative sources for assessing and teaching more functional skills, they often find few available options. In this discussion, Dr. Patrick McGreevy, BCBA-D, and his colleague Troy Fry, M.A., BCBA will provide a brief introduction to Essential for Living (EFL), a verbal behavior based functional skills curriculum which allows utilizers to target skills with children and adults with moderate-to-severe developmental disabilities. These skills are critical for effective daily living, leading to maximized independence in every-day situations and an improved quality of life for students of all ages. Additional discussion related to the reach and utilization of the EFL will be lead by Morgan VanDenBerg, BCBA and Department Specialist with the Children and Adults with Autism Spectrum Disorder section within the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS), and Brie Elasser, BCBA and Director of Quality and Compliance with Autism Centers of Michigan.

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


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






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


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
