Wednesday Morning Workshops March 3, 2021 - 9:00am to 12:00pm

An Individualized Empowerment Program: The IEP for Special Educators, Caretakers, and Other Service Providers



Presenter: Dr. Brandis Ansley; Assistant Professor of Special Education, Central Michigan University

Special educators, caretakers, and other service providers ("Spectaculars") are compassionate and empathetic human beings dedicated to bringing out the best in children and youth with disabilities. It is no secret that these individuals face intense demands in their roles and often put their needs last. Furthermore, recent events have highlighted the need for Spectaculars, in addition to their typically demanding responsibilities, to be vocal and visible advocates, activists, and agents of change.

This critical work often leaves Spectaculars feeling discouraged or defeated by external factors beyond their control. At some point, many experience compassion fatigue – a condition that includes burnout, secondary traumatic stress, or both. Compassion fatigue jeopardizes their personal well-being and capacity to perform in their roles. In response, self-care has become a trending topic for Spectaculars and others in similar roles. However, they need much more than encouragement to take care of themselves. As such, participants of this workshop will:

- · Learn about the research findings relevant compassion satisfaction and compassion fatigue
- Assess and identify their individual strengths, needs, preferences, and interests that empower their own well-being and capacity to perform in their supportive role to others
- Develop an individualized empowerment plan that can be implemented to best support the Spectacular's well-being, quality of life, and capacity to fulfill their demanding roles.

Practical Trauma-Informed Strategies to Reduce Anxiety in Students



Presenter: Jessica Minahan; Board-Certified Behavior Analyst

With up to one in three children struggling with anxiety in this country, overwhelmed adults require a new approach as well as a practical and easy-to-implement toolkit of strategies that work. In the time of Covid-19, and the subsequent societal changes, anxiety has become ever-present in students of all ages. It is probable that during a pandemic that heavily impacts everyday life, levels of anxiety in children and teens are even higher, and the possibility of subsequent trauma greater.

Through the use of case studies, humorous stories, and examples of everyday challenging situations, participants will learn easy to implement preventive tools, strategies, and interventions for reducing anxiety, increasing self-regulation, accurate thinking, and self-monitoring in students. Virtual classroom and traditional classroom examples will be shared.

Wednesday Afternoon Workshops March 3, 2021 - 1:00pm to 4:00pm

UDL and Multiple Means of Expression

Presenter: Dr. Lee Ann Jung; CEO of Lead Inclusion



In this session, Lee Ann will guide participants to consider the many ways students can demonstrate their understanding, whether learning at a distance or in their classrooms. We explore these multiple means of expression within the context of construct validityensuring that we are measuring what we intend to measure. We generate solutions to these questions: Why are options for expression important? How can we support our teams to provide students with options to show their learning in a way that improves, rather than compromises validity? How do we provide options and maintain a perception of fairness?

Understanding Oppression and Privilege and Supporting Positive Racial Identity Development







Presenters: Jamie Almanzán, Graig Meyer, Aaron Johnson; The Equity Collaborative, LLC

In this workshop, we will explore neuroscience research that shows providing space for people to be listened to, share experiences, and process both emotionally and cognitively, enables them to see how school and classroom structures can either benefit or hinder equity goals. We

will explore how our brains react when addressing racial bias and equity and practice techniques that can catalyze change. For educators in any part of school systems, the practice of listening can have a profound impact on our desired outcomes. We will begin to understand how listening creates opportunities for increased cultural responsiveness, builds alliances across race and role, and catalyze change across a system.

Keynote - Jamie Almanzán March 4, 2021 - 1:30pm to 2:30pm



Listening Across Difference and Exploring Bias and Cultural Schema

Presenter: Jamie Almanzán, The Equity Collaborative, LLC

It is through listening that real change can occur. Listening as a practice can be both a tool for healing from the impact of systemic oppression and a diagnostic tool toward achieving equity. This interactive keynote workshop provides a large-scale roll out of an organization's equity initiatives. It will allow for a common equity focused vocabulary to be shared throughout the participants at all levels. The core goal will be to build

the knowledge of the attendees of the MCEC conference and increase their capacity and ability to address various inequities related to the students and families they serve. Participants should come away with a clear approach for thinking about how the understanding and application of an equity centered framework can support change at multiple levels in the system.



The session describes a pilot study in which teacher candidates volunteered from January-April 2020 to participate in an online stress intervention during their student teaching placement. Despite unanticipated disruptions related to COVID-19, 28 candidates completed the study. Outcomes measured before and after the intervention indicated that program participants: (a) significantly increased their teacher efficacy, self-compassion, and use of cognitive reappraisal strategies; and (b) decreased their levels of stress and burnout. However, comparison participants indicated no significant changes for these outcomes. In addition, program participants experienced a small, insignificant reduction in secondary traumatic stress, but comparison participants experienced a significant increase, which suggests that program participation may buffer the impact of secondary trauma while student-teaching. Such findings have implications for all educators and are presented in this session.

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
